'Waltzing Matilda' is Australia's best known folksong. It is sung all over the world. It was written down in Queensland, a state in Australia, in 1895. In Australia there are very big sheep farms which were patrolled by soldiers or troopers. The farmer, called a 'squatter', controlled the land. He employed migrant workers or 'swagmen' to work for him. 'Swagmen' worked seasonally and then went off to look for other jobs.

'Waltzing Matilda' tells the story of a swagman who camped by a pool (a billabong) one night and killed a sheep (a jumbuck). He was going to cook it but he was discovered by the troopers and the squatter. He didn't want to be arrested so he

jumped into the billabong and drowned. It's a sad song but its melody is very lively. A matilda is a blanket for sleeping in — rolled up. So 'waltzing matilda' means dancing and using your sleeping blanket as a partner.
